ABOUT THE SERIES

The *Critical Perspectives on the Psychology of Sexuality, Gender, and Queer Studies* series invites contributions that denaturalize, problematize, and deconstruct fundamental gendered issues and that bridge the gap between research and lived experience. It seeks scholarship that engages critically with the social and political uses of psychological knowledge; with how social and political issues impact significantly on the notion of gender and on how persons react to their gender issues; and with transformative paradigms that address obstacles to change, including how the idea of gender equality threatens existing politico-economic structures. The series will move beyond dichotomies in gender theory and will include critiques of “insider” psychological practices that consciously or unconsciously perform the discriminating practices that put trans (and others) “outside.” Associated issues include identity, perception, and victimization, as well as conflict between the official status of transgender people and the actual problems they deal with on account of a lack of institutional preparedness. The series will critique the psychological idea that gender issues can be classified as male or female, straight or queer.
