While many of the challenges faced in project management are common across fields and industries, there are some important differences in the health system.



Professor Judith Dwyer is Director of Research in the Department of Health Care Management at the Flinders University School of Medicine, and a former CEO of Southern Health Care Network in Melbourne, and of Flinders Medical Centre in Adelaide. Judith has worked in the Australian health system for more than 20 years. She was for several years a Research Program Leader in the Cooperative Research Centre for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health.



Professor Dwyer is Deputy Chair of the board of Cancer Council Australia, and a director of Cancer Council South Australia. She is the lead author of Project Management in Health and Community Services, 2nd edition, published by Allen and Unwin in 2013, and is currently working on the 3rd edition. Professor Dwyer is the 2014 recipient of the Sidney Sax medal, awarded in recognition of life-long contribution to Australia's health.
